Treasures of the Trail.... (part 5)

A trip through the twelve villages of Washington County...

As we proceed south on Highway 15, just south of Linn you will approach the shortest state highway in Kansas, and as you turn to the west the town of Palmer is sitting at the base of the hill along Pete's Creek to greet you. Palmer is a friendly little town that has its own lumber yard, bank, grocery store, gas station, cafe and elevator. Palmer was originally located two miles south of its present location. C.D. Potter settled in the location in 1870, started a store and named the village Pete's Creek. Other settlers opened stores in the locale in 1871, and the community began to prosper. When the residents of Pete's Creek realized that the railroad was not going to come to them, they decided to move the town two miles north to the railroad. Residents renamed the community "Palmer" in 1879 in honor of J. Palmer, one of the first Superintendents of Public Instruction in Washington County. The Palmer Community Café is a local gathering place and is the only place that you can get a hair cut and a burger at the same place. On Thursday nights the specialty is the "Palmer Burger" (A burger big enough to fill a small plate). Palmer celebrates "Labor Day" annually with a parade down its gravel street, pasture golf, rides, flea market, and BBQ. It is a must attend events for local residents as they gather for Palmer Fun Day...be sure to join them this year....In Palmer..It's just a friendly little town!



Enjoy Historic Barnes...

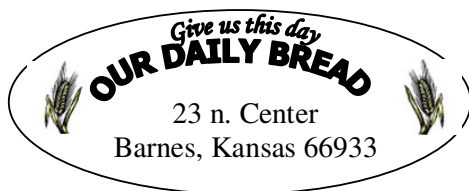
